Bible Correspondence Course Lesson One

THE BIBLE: GOD'S MESSAGE

With this lesson, you the students, are beginning a diligent study of the greatest book mankind has ever received. Each lesson studied is based completely on the book of books, the Bible, and reveals various sections of it. In this course the Bible is accepted as the source of authority, being inspired by God delivering His word to men and they in turn writing the books contained therein. Because of God's desire for man to know His wishes, He has chosen this media for man to receive His will. Because of this it is more responsible for the changing of human events than any other book ever printed.

For thousands of years the Bible has been the motivating force in setting standards morality. Those who search its pages for historical information accept it as a source book. It has improved the condition of every nation who has accepted it and lived by it, treating it with respect and honour.

This book contains the mind of God, the state of man, the way of salvation, the doom of sinners. **Its doctrine are** holy, its precepts are binding, its histories are true and its decisions immutable. Read it to be wise, believe it to be safe, and practice it to be holy. It contains light to direct you, food to sustain you and comfort to cheer you. It should fill the memory, rule the heart and guide the feet

May the Lord richly bless you in this study of his Holy Word.

The Old Testament

The Bible is divided into two main divisions, the Old Testament (originally written in Hebrew) and the New Testament (Originally written in Greek). It consists of sixty-six books written by about forty different men over a period of sixteen hundred years. The writers consist of kings, soldiers, Shepard's, farmers and fishermen. It was begun by Moses in the lonely desert of Arabia and finished by John on the Isle of Patmos. Some of it was written in king's palaces, some in Shepard's tents, some beside still waters and part of was written from prison.

Parts of the bible were written by highly educated men and parts were written by unlettered fishermen. It was written in different languages and different countries. Yet, when all the books of the bible are brought together they blend into one great whole. They are a unit, hence the Book. There are no contradictions, there is no discord. It is never necessary to rewrite the Bible and bring it up to date. These men could have written such a book only by divine guidance. They blend harmoniously because they were written under the direction of the Holy Spirit of God.

GOD THEN MAN

"In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth". God created man in His image and placed him in the Garden of Eden to live. After Adam and Eve's sin they were cast out of the garden and had two sons Cain and Abel. Abel was the more righteous, and Cain being jealous, killed his brother, thus becoming the murderer (Genesis 4). A third son, Seth, was the forefather of such great characters as Noah, Abraham, David and Christ (Genesis 5).

Within a few hundred years the world became so wicked that God decided it must be destroyed. Only Noah and his family had remained faithful, but the world refused the many warnings through Noah. Only eight souls were saved (Genesis 7; 1 Peter 3:20); Noah, his wife, his three sons and their wives. The Jewish people were descendants of Shem.

The Beginning of Israel

The next great bible character was Abraham. Two of his sons were Ishmael (the father of the mixed Arabs) and Isaac. We will be most concerned with Isaac since the nation of Israel came through him (Genesis 15:21).

Lot was the nephew of Abraham. Through him sprang the Moabites and the Ammonites (Genesis 19). These later became bitter enemies of Abraham's descendants. Isaac had two sons – Esau and Jacob. Esau's descendants were the Edomites. Jacob had twelve sons, who with their sons moved to Egypt. Their descendants formed the nation of Israel sometimes called "Children of Israel" after their father Jacob, whose name was changed to Israel by God (Genesis 32:28).

MOSES AND DELIVERANCE

After Several years in Egypt, the Israelites were enslaved by the Egyptians. The many years of hard bondage soon ceased as they were led out of Egypt by Moses under the direction of God. Because of Pharaoh's stubbornness, God brought ten plagues upon the Egyptians before the people were released (Exodus 7-12). By a miracle of God they crossed the Red Sea on dry ground and thus escaped the Egyptian soldiers (Exodus 14). It is estimated that by this time the Israelites numbered more than two million people.

Shortly after crossing the Red Sea, they came to Mount Sinai where Moses was given the Ten Commandments by God (Exodus 20). While at Sinai God gave to the people laws governing their activities both religiously and in their everyday life. Following this they begun their journey through the wilderness. The people proved to God on various occasions that their faith was weak and small and not deserving of the Promised Land which God had promised. They continually complained and criticized and for these reasons God caused them to wander in the wilderness forty years (Numbers 14).

Following the death of Moses, Joshua led the people across the Jordan River and into the promised land of Canaan which they finally conquered and divided among the tribes (<u>Joshua 11:23</u>).

When Joshua died God gave the judges to rule the people. During this period such famous leaders as Samson, Gideon, and Samuel lived (<u>Judges 1-21</u>). After several years they became as their

neighboring nations and demanded a king to rule them. God granted their wish and the first kings were Saul, David and Solomon.

A DIVIDED KINGDOM

The death of Solomon brought a divided kingdom. Ten tribes under jeroboam rebelled forming the Northern Kingdom (still known as Israel) while two tribes (Judah and Benjamin) under Solomon's son, Rehoboam, formed the Southern Kingdom, simply known as "Judah" (1 Kings 12). Because of their wickedness and idolatry the Northern Kingdom was soon taken into Assyrian captivity and was never heard of as a nation again.

END OF THE OLD TESTAMENT

Within a few years the two Southern tribes were taken captive by Nebucadnezzar, king of the Babylonian Empire. After a number of years they were allowed to return to Jerusalem and rebuild the walls of the temple under the direction of Zerubbabel, Ezra and Nehemiah. The last three prophets Haggai, Zechariah and Malachi preached at the times contemporary with Ezra and Nehemiah. They attempted to awaken the people to first rebuild the temple and later to rebuild the walls of Jerusalem. They too preached to return the people to God's way.

The remaining Old Testament history has to do mainly with the general activities of the returning Jews, and leads towards but not include the birth of Christ. Following the book of Malachi there remain four hundred (400) years of history, not covered in the Old Testament, but important years of events, laying down the preparation for the coming of Jesus Christ. These years between the Old and New Testament are called intertestamental years.

ARCHAEOLOGY AND THE OLD TESTAMENT

For hundreds of years, men of learning have turned to the Old Testament for the only record of numerous places, events and people of the ancient world. Many of these records have been scoffed at by scholars but time has proven with the aid of recent archaeological discoveries that the bible is true.

The skeptics once claimed no such nation as the Hittites ever existed, but the Bible mentioned it (<u>Genesis 15:20</u>). Records of Egypt and Assyria have now been found showing that the Hittites for nearly seven centuries were one of the greatest nations on earth. <u>Genesis 11:31</u> talks about Abram (Abraham) living in UR of the Chaldeans. Many once scorned this statement but recent archeological diggings discovered its ruin.

The fallen walls of ancient Jericho have been located and the remains fit exactly to the description given in <u>Joshua 6</u>. Excavations show that the wall did fall outward quite flat filling the ditch which surrounded the city. Further diggings show that the city was intentionally burned, but was not sacked or plundered, according to the Biblical record.
